Session Description	What type of situation is the mostly likely to spawn a judicial ethics complaint? Judges are constantly barraged by situations that are fraught with peril – and not just in the decision-making process. The code of judicial conduct provides guidance for judges to avoid ethical pitfalls and help to create confidence in the courts. But some of these pitfalls are more common than others. How do you identify and avoid these fact patterns? Is it even possible in today's litigious society to avoid complaints altogether?
